The championship futures landscape in college hoops is a wild ride. Unlike college football, where you can practically sketch out Ohio State's path to the College Football Playoff, the NCAA tournament throws 68 teams into a blender, serving up chaos every spring. The sheer volume of contenders, the single-elimination format, and the huge stylistic contrasts make forecasting a champion far more unpredictable than in any other sport. Navigating this market means embracing the madness, not pretending there's a tidy roadmap.

My strategy is to sift through different pockets of value at several levels. I'll normally back a top program that's flying slightly under the radar, angle for a mid-tier team with legit upside, and sprinkle in a sleeper with the talent or system to shock the public. This year, I'm completely passing on the top-tier squads and opting to take three shots further down the board. Sometimes, these tickets aren't really about finding teams that'll actually end up cutting down the nets, it's about snatching a solid price and keeping hedging options in play as the tournament unfolds.

Let's dive into some early futures I'm punching for 2025-26:

NC STATE WOLFPACK (60/1)

Will Wade is a proven winner, and he's earned a reputation as a master of talent acquisition. While his earlier methods raised some eyebrows, there's nobody better equipped to thrive in the NIL era. Now back at a high-major program, with substantial support from NC State's boosters, Wade is positioned to make a big impact.

Wade is expected to turn NC State into a powerhouse, but just how quickly he'll get there is a fair question. It could happen immediately.

Tre Holloman is slated to start at point guard. The senior arrives after averaging 9.1 points and 3.7 assists per game for Michigan State last season, bringing smart playmaking and hard-nosed defense to the Wolfpack. At shooting guard, NC State has two strong choices in Matt Able (the 24th-ranked player in the ESPN 100) and Paul McNeil. Able offers three-level scoring, while McNeil's floor spacing could get him the nod; he has the potential to be one of the ACC's best shooters.

The forward spots will be filled with high-level transfers: Terrance Arceneaux from Houston and Darrion Williams from Texas Tech. Arceneaux's defense on the wing should be elite, and he's got the tools to contribute offensively. Though his career was interrupted by a torn ACL, a bigger opportunity awaits in Raleigh. Williams, Texas Tech's best offensive player last year, posted 15.1 points, 5.5 rebounds, and 3.6 assists. He's dangerous from beyond the arc and strong enough to excel as a small-ball four.

In the middle, Ven-Allen Lubin transfers in after a controversial move from UNC. He averaged 8.7 points and 5.5 rebounds per game last season. Lengthy, capable off the dribble, and solid in the post, Lubin's two-way ability should make him a strong starter.

Following Wade from McNeese State, Quadir Copeland also projects as a key contributor. He's athletic, brings energy on defense, and manages to make things happen offensively even without a reliable jumper.

Defense could be this team's calling card, which makes sense given Wade's history: in his final season at LSU, his team ranked sixth in KenPom's adjusted defensive efficiency.

The lone question is whether NC State will be strong enough offensively. Williams helps in that department, and with several breakout candidates on the roster, it's likely the Wolfpack challenge for top ACC status right away.

At 60/1, these odds could look generous by March.

WISCONSIN BADGERS (75/1)

Wisconsin ranked 12th in KenPom's adjusted efficiency margin last season and was top 25 nationally in both adjusted offensive and defensive efficiency. John Tonje's departure is a major loss after putting up 19.6 points and 5.3 rebounds per game on elite shooting splits — he

had one of the most statistically impressive campaigns in school history. The departure of assistant coach Kirk Penney, who helped modernize Wisconsin's offense, is another key storyline.

Penney's impact was clear, with Wisconsin jumping from 226th to 16th in threes attempted nationally. Greg Gard says that the offensive changes will remain even after Penney returns to New Zealand. If Gard sticks with the system, the Badgers should be able to fill the void left by Tonje — and possibly do more damage in March.

Stars John Blackwell and Nolan Winter are back after standout sophomore seasons. Blackwell averaged 15.8 points, 5.1 rebounds, and 2.2 assists per game and looks primed to be the main scorer. He's a skilled shooter and an intelligent scorer. Winter brings 9.4 points and 5.8 rebounds per game as a stretch five with touch inside.

Gard reloaded via the transfer portal: Nick Boyd (San Diego State), Andrew Rohde (Virginia), and Austin Rapp (Portland) fill out the starting five. Boyd is a tenacious competitor at point and brings Final Four experience from his days at Florida Atlantic. Rohde, who shot 41.3% from 3 last year, offers solid playmaking and improved defense. Rapp, who averaged 13.8 points, 6.5 rebounds, 2.5 assists, and 1.5 blocks, projects as a strong frontcourt fit next to Winter; his shooting gives Wisconsin five legitimate 3-point options at all times along with help protecting the rim.

Few college lineups can match the Badgers' range and versatility, and Gard's teams consistently play smart, fundamentally sound basketball. At 75/1, there's value here — especially if rotation players can provide steady minutes, giving Wisconsin a higher ceiling than most expect.

OREGON DUCKS (100/1)

It's a bit strange that Oregon is available at 100/1 despite welcoming back Jackson Shelstad and Nate Bittle to Eugene. Shelstad averaged 13.7 points per game last season, posting efficient shooting splits of 45.1% from the field, 37.9% from 3, and 83.5% from the line, which earned him All-Big Ten Third Team honors. Bittle joined Shelstad on that same team, averaging 14.2 points, 7.6 rebounds, and leading the conference with 2.1 blocks per game. Shelstad is an impressive shotmaker who's becoming more polished as a floor general. Bittle, meanwhile, is an excellent finisher around the rim, dangerous as a pick-and-pop option, and a true anchor defensively.

Oregon's greatest strength comes at two of the most critical spots: point guard and center. Pairing that foundation with head coach Dana Altman — who has won 20+ games in each of his 15 seasons at Oregon — sets the Ducks up with a remarkably high floor. Last season, they finished 27th in KenPom's adjusted efficiency rankings.

Don't overlook the team's upside, either, since Chinese flamethrower Wei Lin and transfer Takai Simpkins will add to Oregon's backcourt arsenal. Lin put up 21.6 points per game in the CBA, so he's proven himself against pro competition. Simpkins averaged 16.4 points and shot 36.7% from deep for Elon, and that kind of scoring should translate well to Big Ten play.

Transfers Devon Pryor and Sean Stewart — both athletic and skilled — could thrive with Oregon after limited roles at Texas and Ohio State, respectively. Altman's history of maximizing transfers is well documented.

One big wild card: Is this the season Kwame Evans breaks out? Evans was a top-15 recruit, but has yet to fully emerge for the Ducks. At the very least, he should be able to take pressure off Bittle when it comes to doing some dirty work. Though Altman will be expecting a little more than that.

Oregon could also get a boost from Dezdrick Lindsay, who didn't play last year after transferring from Florida Southwestern, but was one of the top JUCO players in the nation. There's a real chance Altman takes advantage of his scoring punch this season.

With a mix of proven stars and intriguing newcomers, Oregon offers a compelling blend of reliability and upside. Shelstad and Bittle will keep the Ducks competitive, but if Altman gets the most out of his athletic wings, their potential far exceeds public perception.

WOODEN AWARD FUTURES BOARD

Let's take a shot at handicapping this year's Wooden Award futures board.

Shot is the operable word here since this year's favorite is going to need to make a lot of them, many from behind the arc, to ultimately take home the award.

Purdue's Braden Smith (+550) starts the season atop the odds board, due in large part to the lack of a prominent big man fitting the profile of recent winners Cooper Flagg and Zach Edey.

So before any Wooden Award wagers are made, the prevailing mindset of voters must first be identified as a key variable.

Sure, Smith can score, as he averaged 15.8 PPG a season ago and should do even more in 2026, but as a point guard, he conducts his offensive work much differently than the past seven winners.

The last group of winners was a combination of power forwards and centers.

The 6-footer Smith's game is more reminiscent of the trio of winners from 2016-2018 (Buddy Hield, Frank Mason III and Jalen Brunson).

MEASURING UP

One way to handicap Smith's chances of winning the award is to first get an idea of what type of statistical performance is needed to be in line with the accomplishments of Hield, Mason III and Brunson during their Wooden Award winning campaigns.

The past seven winners are excluded from a comparative analysis because voters scrutinize guards differently than forwards.

Below are the offensive averages for those guards during their Wooden Award seasons. Also included is how high their clubs ranked in the AP Poll during the last quarter of the season as an indication of the team success that is needed to win the award.

For Smith to jump from 15.8 points to 21.6 points, it would require a 36% increase in scoring during his senior year. Take into account that Smith had a 24% increase in scoring from his freshman to sophomore year and another 24% increase from sophomore to junior season. So if Smith continues the trend of increasing his scoring output at 24% each year, he would end this season at 19.6 PPG. Even if he doesn't get to that 21.6 PPG, Smith's numbers should be comparable to, or even better than, those Wooden Award winners.

TIER 1 FAVORITES

BRADEN SMITH (+550)

Breakdown

Last year in the VSiN College Basketball Betting Guide, we placed the Wooden candidates into different tiers, with the top one filled with a number of high-profile names including Flagg, RJ Davis, Hunter Dickinson and Mark Sears.

This year it is a group of one with Smith's odds coming in close to half of the next name on the board JT Toppin (+950).

Smith rightfully begins the season way ahead of the pack since he serves as the floor general for the favorite to win a national championship (Purdue +900).

Under a national spotlight, Smith has the green light to score from Matt Painter. With senior teammates Fletcher Loyer on the perimeter and Trey Kaufman-Renn down low, Smith's already impressive assists number should keep on rising. Averaging a double-double would place him in the same double-double conversation with recent winners Edey, Oscar Tshiebwe and, a little further back, Anthony Davis, who also accomplished that feat - albeit with rebounds instead of assists

There is every reason to believe Smith will finish with a better average stat line than other point guards who have also won the award - Trey Burke (18.6 PPG, 3.2 RPG and 6.7 APG in 2013), Jameer Nelson (20.6

PPG, 4.7 RPG, and 5.3 APG in 2004) and T.J. Ford (15.0 PPG, 3.9 RPG, and 7.7 APG in 2003).

Perhaps just as importantly, all three PGs were running the show for a team ranked in the Top 3 of the AP Poll late in the season when voters were deep in decision-making mode.

That makes the averages for the past three guards to win the Wooden Award as 21.6 PPG, 3.9 APG and 4.3 RPG. Compare that with Smith's line from a year ago: 15.8 PPG, 8.7 APG and 4.5 RPG.

With his assists and rebounds easily surpassing those averages, raising his point total would dramatically increase his chances of winning since his team already comes with a No.1 ranking.

In essence, a Wooden Award bet on Smith is correlated with Purdue (+200) winning the Big Ten regular season title. Because if Purdue stumbles, it will likely be Michigan taking that crown and that would place Yaxel Lendeborg (10/1) in an optimal position to be the Wooden Award winner.

TIER 2 FAVORITES

JT TOPPIN (+950) YAXEL LENDEBORG (10/1) DARRYN PETERSON (11/1) CAMERON BOOZER (12/1) AJ DYBANTSA (12/1)

Breakdown

Much more crowded real estate down here.

Toppin offers the most brand-name recognition after his sensational season a year ago for a Texas Tech squad that lost a heartbreaker to Florida in the Elite Eight. Now Toppin will lead the Red Raiders without Darrion Williams, who moved on to NC State. That absence could help Toppin raise his scoring numbers (18.2 PPG & 9.4 RPG), while also hurting since one less star player is around to help Texas Tech get more marquee victories.

Just like Smith, Toppin's production last year jumped significantly from the season prior, making an average of 20 points and 10 rebounds in 2026 a likely occurrence.

Much of the handicapping process for this award is determining if a current player fits a profile voters valued in the past. There is a lot of Tshiebwe in Toppin's game.

The problem, though, is

might not get a Top 5 ranking
like Kentucky had in 2022.

Call Lendeborg the poster child of Wooden Award candidates in the transfer portal era. He spent parts of three seasons at Arizona

Western then left the JUCO level for two solid campaigns at UAB. Now, at 23 years old, he has experience and a leading role for a power conference squad hunting for a national championship. He can be this season's Dalton Knecht.

The others in this group are the prototypical Freshman Sensations.

Peterson is making a pit stop in Lawrence before being the likely No.1 pick in next season's NBA Draft. Bill Self is planning on the 6-foot-6 guard being the key to his Kansas squad turning around what has been three straight underwhelming seasons.

With a similar amount of hype comes Boozer at Duke to play where his father once did, and Dybantsa is generating some Danny Ainge-like anticipation at BYU.

Narratives play a role for these two. Boozer can be the second straight Duke freshman to win the award. Dybantsa will get a lot of ink regarding BYU's ascension from semi-pretender to legitimate national contender.

Within this group, Toppin offers bettors significantly more security and equity.

Freshmen winning the award certainly isn't common and is yet to happen in consecutive seasons (Flagg 2025, Zion Williamson 2019, Anthony Davis 2012, Kevin Durant 2007).

TIER 3 AND BEYOND

Breakdown

Before a bettor dismisses this group because they aren't near the top of the odds board, consider the current names contending for the Heisman Award. Two of those names are not Arch Manning and Cade Klubnik, the preseason favorites.

Perhaps there is Dante Moore, John Mateer or Fernando Mendoza in this talent pool.

The name I want to jump on here is Oweh since there is so much upside to what Mark Pope can do in Kentucky during his second season. The problem however is that Oweh suffered a turf toe injury

during summer workouts. Reports indicate he says that he is healthy and ready to go, however, in the name of Brock Purdy, that is an injury that can linger.

Dent is another possibility because of all that scoring he did last year in New Mexico. The problem, though, is this offensive-minded guard is now in the Mick Cronin grind-it-out defense system at UCLA.

Dent should bring the Bruins more scoring punch and help them in the Big Ten standings, but he is likely in a situation that won't allow his offensive production to reach Wooden Award levels.

The versatile 6-foot-6 Williams is now with Will Wade at NC State. He showed plenty of flashes at Nevada and Texas Tech, but has never been a true No.1 option. Wade will provide that chance.

Here is one major longshot to contemplate for a small sized wager: Tucker DeVries (150/1). This is my addition to Mitch and Pauly's tip jar. The sixth-year senior is healthy after playing only eight games for his father at West Virginia last year. During that time, the former Drake star shot 47.3% from 3-point territory. Now father, Darian, and son are in Indiana and that type of storyline can create some much needed media attention in the younger DeVries' favor.

OVERVIEW

The season could have been very rocky for Florida. Head coach Todd Golden was under investigation in September for a Title IX violation that included allegations of sexual harassment and stalking. While the university was continuing to dig in, Golden kept the focus on basketball as best he could. Florida was 13-0 before losing on January 4 in the conference opener to Kentucky. By the end of the month, the university cleared him of any wrongdoing and the Gators would go on to win 17 of their final 18 games, including a 77-75 win over two-time reigning champion UConn in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

So the Gators won it all and, as luck would have it, went through the previous champs to do it. Running it back may not be a stretch. Per Bart Torvik, Florida returns over 40% of last season's minutes. Alex Condon and Thomas Haugh were fourth and fifth in points per game, so more will be expected of them as transfers try to make up the rest of the scoring. On the perimeter, Boogie Fland from Arkansas and Xaivian Lee from Princeton are high-upside transfers.

OVERVIEW

Jim Larranaga leaves Miami as a legend, but even he knew it was time for new blood — and the Hurricanes landed a potential star in Jai Lucas. Lucas, once a top assistant at Duke, arrives with the reputation as an elite recruiter and player developer, backed by some serious NIL resources that should let Miami take real swings in the talent market.

Lucas wasted zero time making his mark, flipping five-star wing Shelton Henderson from Duke and reeling in Michigan transfer Tre Donaldson, who put up 11.3 points and 4.1 assists per game while shooting 37.5% from 3 last season. Expect Henderson to be an impact guy right away, with Donaldson running the show as a reliable lead guard who can also fill it up. Tru Washington, a physical guard from New Mexico, is in the mix for a starting role, and freshmen Dante Allen and Jordyn Kee bring more upside to a revamped backcourt rotation.

The frontcourt has the bigger question marks. Ernest Udeh is a big-body transfer from TCU, but Indiana transfer Malik Reneau may be a better option playing as a small-ball five.

Lucas has a plan in place, and the talent will come. This year is about building, but it won't be long before Miami's aiming higher than a first-weekend March cameo.

Sustaining success as a mid-major has never been harder. Between the transfer portal and the quick trigger finger from athletic directors who don't want to get pink-slipped alongside the head coach, it is so hard to keep everything together for more than a season or two. Florida Atlantic was a perfect example. Dusty May's spectacular two-year run in Boca Raton led to a job at Michigan. After 60 wins over two seasons, FAU struggled to finish north of .500 at 18-16 and 10-8 in American play.

After riding their best horses very hard through the middle of the season, the Owls' lack of depth was on display with six losses in their final nine games, including a loss to Tulane in the conference tournament with 1.281 points per possession allowed. Now FAU has a completely rebuilt roster with zero returning starters and John Jakus has a tough job ahead of him, even with some power-program transfers. Time is of the essence, as this team is very talented, but very raw all over the floor. Jakus bumped up the tempo last season and I think we see another increase this season
